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## Information for participants

Dear participants, we are looking forward to starting the cooperation with you in Italy. On the following pages you will find some useful information about the training course. Please read it carefully, as some of them are very important; everything written in this infopack, once you receive it, will be considered as fully understood and agreed.

As you might know from other Erasmus+ projects, we will use our time during the training for different activities that aim to motivate and make you eager to share your thoughts and experiences, delving into an experiential learning environment.



The group will consist of 28 participants (including trainers and organizing team), coming from Italy, Croatia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Republic of North Macedonia, Sweden, Turkey and UK. This will enable you to meet different people and even to find partner organizations for your further activities within the framework of Erasmus+ programme, but remember that such contacts are the bonuses of the project, not the main content

## Project summary

The training course "Youth Work for Equality and Unity" aims to tackle one of the biggest issues of our time. As Europe is experiencing one of the most significant influxes of migrants and refugees in its history, the inability to deal with the situation is urging NGOs to increase their level of competences to face such issues. Many NGOs that work with youngsters and want to deal with themes like human rights and migration don't actually have the expertise, in terms of knowledge and human resources, to do so.

This project is therefore designed for youth workers, young leaders, volunteers or simply humanitarian individuals who have special interest in human rights and social inclusion, and/or are involved with migrants or refugees in their Countries, and have intention to use their competences to be more involved in their communities, fighting discrimination and radicalization.

Based on the considerations above, specific objectives of the project are:

- Work on common and shared definitions, learn the proper terminology and the relevant documents and institutions in the field of human rights and migration
- Analyze the different perspectives on HR and migration, taking into account the hosting Countries and the specific conditions of each context
- To tackle exclusion, discrimination, xenophobia and radicalization, promoting diversity and fostering social inclusion, mostly of vulnerable groups
- Give youth workers the chance to experience different NFE approaches, methods and tools in order to encourage active youth participation in their local contexts in respect of human rights and integration of migrants/refugees



-Expand participants' and partner NGOs' contacts and networks and foster exchange of good practices

Through non-formal education methodologies we aim to provide participants with the right tools to strengthen their learning process, creating an experiential and inclusive environment that will be completely focused on their needs. Everyone will be encouraged to share experiences and take initiatives and challenges, with the support of trainers and organizing team







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The program shown is a draft and it can be subject to changes according to organizational needs. Activities can be modified also according to proposals of partners or participants during the preparation phase or the Training itself, and as result of daily evaluation and reflection groups. We will do our best to guarantee you a great experience!!!

## Preparation

Ideally, once the group is completed, at least one preparation meeting should happen. If it's not possible, you can plan a Skype call and use all the means of communication that you consider suitable and effective (FB or WhatsApp groups, shared documents, etc) to prepare and stay in touch about every possible need.



Preparatory tasks for every national group include:

- Find information about the situation in your Country regarding human rights and migration. During the second day every national team is going to share the findings to the rest of the group in order to have an overview of the scenarios in each of the participating Countries
- Prepare at least 2 Energizers, you will use one to open your part of the session, and another during the week
- There will be 3 intercultural evenings, with 3 Countries in charge of each. On these evenings you are expected to make interactive and creative presentations to let us discover your culture. You can use: traditional food, drinks, music, dresses, flags, brochures. You can also make quiz, performances and/or theatre sketches and on that way present tradition, customs, religion, language, dance and people from your country

N.B. try to avoid promotional/touristic youtube videos that everybody can find, be original and unique!

## For the program – what to bring:

- Something interesting that you want to show/teach/share with the others,
   materials and info from your sending organization
- Standard & Sport equipment: alarm clock, any dictionary you might require, comfortable and sport clothes/shoes, etc.
- Fresh ideas for future projects and cooperation
- Good mood and high level of energy to be committed to an educational and enjoyable experience
- Something from your country, to share with others and to stimulate the senses. In particular: bring some food and non-food items from your country for the intercultural evenings but be aware that no kitchen facilities will be available (don't bring food that requires cooking)



## The Venue – How to get there?

To reach the venue you must firstly head to "Caserta". From there we will arrange a transportation at a specific hour that we're going to communicate after all participants have bought their tickets. To start your trip you can land either at Rome or Naples international airports. The closest is Naples (30 km far away) while Rome is more distant (around 180 km). Below there are some useful information to organize your trip:

N.B. It is very important before buying your flight tickets to check the timetables of the trains or buses to/from Caserta (following the instructions in this infopack), and in any case you must be in Caserta at 7:00 p.m. on 16<sup>th</sup> November at latest, because there are no other options to reach the venue apart from the shuttle bus that we're going to provide! As for the way back, don't take any early flight on 24<sup>th</sup> November (not before 10-11 a.m.) as you'll need 2-4 hours to reach the airport from the accommodation (depending if you're travelling from Naples or Rome), and transportation from there to Caserta won't be provided before 7 a.m. If you have any problem to find good options, write your sending organization and we will give you all the necessary support to find the best solutions

#### **Landing in Naples:**



You have 2 options to reach Caserta train station; the fastest and cheapest is the following:

1) Take the "ATC" bus. The stop is located after the roundabout that you find while walking straight from the arrivals terminal. You can see the exact location below, from google street view; the red dot on the left is where the bus stops and the red circled board on the right is zoomed to show exactly how it looks like





The ticket costs 3-4€ and you can do it onboard. The journey takes about 25-30 minutes and at the link below you can find the timetable; bus stop of the airport is "Napoli Capodichino" and in Caserta is "Caserta Stazione FS"; the first timetables of the web page refer to the route and hours TO Napoli, scrolling down you have the same FROM Napoli (left columns are for Monday-Saturday schedule, right are for Sunday and festive days). The other option is advisable only if you want to visit Napoli before heading to Caserta, and it's the following:

2) Take the bus to the main railway station of Napoli (Garibaldi). The bus is named "Alibus", from "anm" company and you can take it outside the arrivals terminal. Just follow directions on the boards from the exit of the terminal to reach the stop (you can actually see the bus also in the picture above, on the right before the roundabout). The

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ticket costs 5€ and you can do it onboard. It leaves every 15-20 minutes and the journey takes about 20-30 minutes. 2a) From the main station of Naples you can take the regional train to Caserta. It costs 3-4€ and the journey takes about 45 minutes. Trains are quite frequent (almost every hour) and you can check on "Trenitalia" website to customize your search and buy your ticket: <a href="http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en.">http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en.</a> From there, we'll pick you up at a specific hour that we're going to tell you



You have 2 options to reach Caserta; the fastest and cheapest is the following:

1) Take the bus "Fiumicino Express" right outside the arrival terminal. The ticket costs around 20€ on average and it's better to buy it online. Buses departs every 2 hours and the journey takes 2:30 hours; timetable and booking from the following website: <a href="https://www.fiumicinoexpress.com/orari-partenze/">https://www.fiumicinoexpress.com/orari-partenze/</a>

N.B. this bus stops 2.3 km from Caserta train station; the image below on the left shows the location of the stop and the walking distance to the station, while the one on the right is the zoomed street view to show exactly how the stop looks like. From there you can walk to the train station (no public transportation available) or wait for the pick-up hour that we're going to tell you





The other option is advisable only if you want to visit Rome before heading to Caserta, and it's the following:

2) Take a bus to the main station (Roma Termini). There are several companies for this route: Terravision, Schiaffini, Cotral, etc. Buses are outside the arrival terminal and there should be runs every 15-20 minutes; tickets cost about 5€ and you can check the websites of the companies for more info and if you want to buy your ticket in advance; in Ciampino, you can buy the tickets inside the arrival terminal or at the bus stop. The journey takes about 45 mins

#### From Roma Termini to Caserta

2a) You can take the train to Caserta. The ticket costs around 12-15€, and the journey takes about 2-3 hours. Trains are quite frequent but you have to change (1 stop) and you can check on "Trenitalia" website to customize your search and buy your ticket: <a href="http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en">http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en</a>. Mind that "regionale" and "intercity" are the economic options with more or less fixed prices, while the others (Frecciarossa or Frecciargento) can be way more expensive and price rises according to approaching travel dates and seats left. Once in Caserta train station we'll pick you up at a specific hour that we're going to tell you

2b) You can head to Tiburtina station (4 metro stops) – the main interregional bus station – and take the Flixbus to Caserta. The ticket costs around 10-15€ on average and the journey takes about 2:30 hours. Buses are quite frequent and direct, you can check on the website to customize your search and buy your ticket: <a href="https://global.flixbus.com/">https://global.flixbus.com/</a> Once in Caserta train station we'll pick you up at a specific hour that we're going to tell you

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#### **Landing in Rome Fiumicino:**



You have 2 options to reach Caserta; the fastest and cheapest is the following:

1) Take the bus "Fiumicino Express" right outside the arrival terminal. The ticket costs around 20€ on average and it's better to buy online. Buses departs every 2 hours and the journey takes 2:30 hours; timetable and booking from the following website: https://www.fiumicinoexpress.com/orari-partenze/

N.B. this bus stops 2.3 km from Caserta train station; the image below on the left shows the location of the stop and the walking distance to the station, while the one on the right is the zoomed street view to show exactly how the stop looks like. From there you can walk to the train station (no public transportation available) or wait for the pick-up hour that we're going to tell you





The other option is advisable only if you want to visit Rome before heading to Caserta:

2) You can take either a bus or a train to the main station (Roma Termini)

By Bus: There are several companies for this route: Terravision, Schiaffini, Cotral, etc. Buses are outside the arrival terminal and there should be runs every 15-20 minutes; tickets cost about 5€ and you can also check the websites of the companies for more information and if you want to buy your ticket in advance; in Fiumicino you can buy the tickets at the bus stop. The journey takes about 50 mins

By train: - It is called "Leonardo Express", it costs 14€ and leaves every 15 minutes. The journey takes about 30 min

You can also take a different train, to "Tiburtina" station. It is the regional train "FL1", it costs 8€ and leaves every 15 minutes; the journey takes about 45 mins. From there, take the underground until "Termini" station (4 stops) [this option is very good if you plan to take the Flixbus, see below the point 2b]

#### From Roma Termini to Caserta

2a) You can take the train to Caserta. The ticket costs around 12-15€, and the journey takes about 2-3 hours. Trains are quite frequent but you have to change for most of the options (1 stop) and you can check on "Trenitalia" website to customize your search and buy your ticket: <a href="http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en.">http://www.trenitalia.com/tcom-en.</a> Mind that "regionale" and "intercity" are the economic options with more or less fixed prices, while the others (Frecciarossa or Frecciargento) can be way more expensive and price rises according to approaching travel dates and seats left. Once in Caserta train station we'll pick you up at a specific hour that we're going to tell you

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## Caserta Train Station & City Center

The train station in Caserta will be the main gathering and pick up point. It's right in front of a magnificent royal palace, world heritage from UNESCO (more info in the next page) and it's also located in the very center of the city, so you can see the palace and spend some time in Caserta if you want to have a walk around. Central squares and streets of Caserta are: piazza Margherita, piazza Vanvitelli, via Ferrante, via Mazzini, corso Trieste (just google it :D).

As concerning the royal palace, since it's really big, it won't take you less than 3 hours if you want to have a decent visit, so keep it in mind and plan your day accordingly. #### Food and Accommodation

You will be accommodated in same gender shared room (according to availability and group composition) with people from other nationalities. All the rooms are equipped with private bathroom, sheets and towels.

You will be provided with three meals per day, plus 2 coffee breaks during the morning and the afternoon sessions (around 11:30 and 17:00 respectively). Since you will be hosted in Italy, meals will mainly be "Italian style", to let you properly discover and delve into Italian food tradition! So get ready to taste delicious pasta and sweet breakfast!

The facility has a wide external space and there is also a farm, as they produce one of the most delicious and famous products of our region: buffalo mozzarella. A lot of the food you are going to eat during the week is produced by them. 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## Caserta and its province

The Province of Caserta is located in Campania region of Italy. Caserta is the main city of the province and it's situated about 36 kilometres north of Naples. The province has an area of 2,639 square kilometres and a population of more than 900.000.

The province of Caserta covered the greatest expanse of territory around the 13th century when it extended from the Tyrrhenian Sea and the islands of Ponza and Ventotene to the Apennines and the southern end of the Roveto Valley. In the Kingdom of Naples and the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, Caserta was one of the most important departments in southern Italy. The first capital of the region was the ancient city of Capua (the city with the second biggest amphiteatre in Italy after Colosseum) until 1818, then Caserta.





Caserta is an important agricultural, commercial and industrial municipality. It is located on the edge of the Campanian plain at the foot of the Campanian Subapennine mountain range.

Modern Caserta was established in Lombard times by Pando, Prince of Capua. The original population moved from Casertavecchia (former bishopric seat) to the current site in the 16th century.

The city and vicinity were the property of the Acquaviva family who, being pressed by huge debts, sold all the land to the royal family. The royal family then selected Caserta for the construction of their new palace which, being inland, was seen as more defensible than the previous palace fronting the Bay of Naples



#### **Royal Palace of Caserta**

The Palace of Caserta is located close to the city, a royal residence constructed for the Bourbon kings of Naples. It was one of the largest buildings erected in Europe during the 18th century and today it's the world's largest royal palace by volume.

In 1997, the palace was designated UNESCO World Heritage Site, described in its nomination as "the swan song of the spectacular art of the Baroque, from which it adopted all the features needed to create the illusions of multidirectional space".



In terms of volume, the Royal Palace of Caserta is the largest royal residence in the world with over 2 million m<sup>3</sup> and covers an area of about 47,000 m<sup>2</sup>.

The construction of the palace was begun in 1752 for Charles VII of Naples, who worked closely with his architect, Luigi Vanvitelli.

In the end Charles VII never slept a night at the Reggia, as he abdicated in 1759 to become King of Spain, and the project was carried to only partial completion for his third son and successor, Ferdinand IV of Naples.

The political and social model for Vanvitelli's palace was Versailles, which, though it is strikingly different in its variety and disposition, solves similar problems of assembling and providing for king, court and government in a massive building with the social structure of a small city.



The palace has 1,200 rooms, including two dozen state apartments, a large library, and a theatre modelled after the Teatro San Carlo of Naples. The palace has a rectangular plan, measuring  $247 \times 184$  m. The four sides are connected by two orthogonal arms, forming four inner courts, each measuring more than 3,800 m<sup>2</sup>.







Of all the royal residences inspired by the Palace of Versailles, the Reggia of Caserta is the one that bears the greatest resemblance to the original model. As at Versailles, a large aqueduct was required to bring water for the prodigious water displays. Like its French predecessor, the palace was intended to display the power and grandeur of an absolute Bourbon monarchy.





The garden, a typical example of the baroque extension of formal vistas, stretches for 120 ha, partly on hilly terrain. It is also inspired by the park of Versailles. The park starts from the back façade of the palace, flanking a long alley with artificial fountains and cascades. There is a botanical garden, called "The English Garden", in the upper part designed in the 1780s by Carlo Vanvitelli and John Graefer.

The fountains and cascades, each filling a "vasca" (basin), with

architecture and hydraulics by Luigi Vanvitelli at intervals along a wide straight canal that runs to the horizon, rivalled those at Peterhof outside St. Petersburg.

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The Caserta Palace has been used as a filming location in a number of movie productions. In 1997 it served as a filming location for Star Wars when it was used as the setting for Queen Amidala's royal palace on Naboo in the 1999 film Star Wars Episode I: The Phantom Menace. It featured again in the 2002 film Star Wars Episode II: Attack of the Clones as Queen Jamilla's palace.

The same room was also used in Mission: Impossible III as Vatican City. In the film, a Lamborghini car is blown up in a square inside the palace. The main staircase is also used in Angels & Demons as the Vatican's staircase.



#### • For the Reimbursement:

To ensure the reimbursement of your travel costs, you are requested to arrange your journey by the most economical route and to make use, wherever possible, of any available reduced tariff (student fares, discount for young people, etc).

Mind that you need to be in Italy on the 16<sup>th</sup> of November and to leave on the 24<sup>th</sup>. You can arrive 1 day earlier and leave 1 day later than the official dates (meaning that you can arrive on 15<sup>th</sup> and leave on 25<sup>th</sup>), but the budget doesn't cover food and accommodation, so you will need to pay your stay by yourself for those days.

The travel costs within the budget limit of your Country (see below) will be reimbursed only if these 3 conditions are fulfilled by **EACH MEMBER OF YOUR GROUP:** 

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## Expense Reimbursement Form



- You gave all the ORIGINAL tickets to our organization. It's fundamental to bring the invoices or the travel confirmations where is clearly shown the price you paid, the date and itinerary of the travel and the date of the purchase; (in case the amount of your ticket is not written in euro, we will use the European commission currency converter with the exchange rate of the day of your purchase)
- You attended the full duration of the training;
- You submitted any report that our organization or EU requested;

Return tickets must all be provided by postal service once you come back home, unless you have the chance to provide them to us during the training itself.

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N.B. We highly recommend this option, as in this case you won't spend the money (not refundable) of the postal service, the reimbursement will be faster because we won't need to wait for your tickets to arrive and there will be no risk to lose the postage. Therefore, we suggest you to make electronic tickets and online check in, if possible

The budget limit per each participant is the following:

Croatia, Republic of North Macedonia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, , Turkey, UK: 250€

Sweden: 335€

The above limit is cut of 25€ compared to the amount granted on the EU distance calculator. The reason is that we're going to pay directly your transportation to and from the venue (the pick-ups on 16<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> of November), so you don't need to pay and get refund for that. The above budget includes all the means of transportation for the round trip as specified in this section of the infopack. If you exceed the above budget, it will be up to you to cover the extra expenses, so try to buy your tickets as soon as possible, in order to avoid the increasing prices (of the flights mostly).

**TAXI, car sharing services and other similar private transportations are not refundable** (e.g. Uber, MyTaxi, Blablacar, etc), so do not consider them as options while planning your trip

#### Health Insurance

Please make sure that coming to the project you have a valid health insurance! For those who have European Health Insurance Card, bring it with you or request it if you're EU resident and you still don't have it, while for those who haven't, you can buy a travel insurance covering potential medical needs.

You can buy it while booking your flights, since companies usually give it as an option, or searching for an insurance online to cover the days of the exchange.



Your health insurance should make it eligible to have medical treatments abroad. This is absolutely a must to join the project.

Costs regarding Health Insurance can be reimbursed ONLY to the Countries not having EU Card and preferably it should be bought together with the flight ticket in the same invoice/confirmation
